

1. To develop competent and assertive agriculture leadership.
2. To develop an awareness of the global importance of agriculture and its contribution to our well-being.
3. To strengthen the confidence of agriculture students in themselves and their work.
4. To promote the intelligent choice and establishment of an agricultural career.
5. To stimulate development and encourage achievement in individual agricultural experience programs.
6. To improve the economic, environmental, recreational and human resources of the community.
7. To develop competencies in communications, human relations and social abilities.
8. To develop charter, train for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism.
9. To build cooperative attitudes among agriculture students.
10. To encourage wise management of resources.
11. To encourage improvement in scholarship.
12. To provide organized recreational activities for agriculture students.

THE EMBLEM

The national FFA emblem, consisting of five symbols, is representative of the history, goals, and future of the organization. As a whole, the emblem covers the broad spectrum of FFA and agriculture. Each element within the emblem has a unique significance. THE CROSS SECTION OF THE EAR OF CORN provides the foundation of the emblem, just as corn has historically served as the foundation crop of American agriculture. It is also a symbol of unity, as corn is grown in every state of the nation. THE RISING SUN signifies progress and holds a promise that tomorrow will bring a new day glowing with opportunity. THE PLOW signifies labor and tillage of the soil, the backbone of agriculture and the historic foundation of our country's strength. THE EAGLE is a national symbol which serves as a reminder of our freedom and ability to explore new horizons for the future of agriculture. THE OWL, long recognized for its wisdom, symbolizes the knowledge required to be successful in the industry of agriculture. The words "AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION" and "FFA" are emblazoned in the necessary for progressive agriculture.

COLORS

As the blue field of our nation's flag and the golden fields of ripened corn unify our country, the FFA colors of NATIONAL BLUE and CORN GOLD give unity to the organization. All FFA functions and paraphernalia should proudly display the colors.

MOTTO

Our motto consists of only four lines filled with practical philosophy, reflecting a spirit and sincerity of youth, the backbone of our nation. The FFA motto gives members twelve, short words to live by as they experience the opportunities in the organization. The FFA Motto is:

Living to Serve

THE FFA CREED

I believe in the future of agriculture, with a faith born not of words but of deeds-achievements won by the present and past generations of agriculturists; in the promise of better things we now enjoy, have come to us from the struggles of former years.

I believe that to live and work on a good farm, or to be engaged in other agricultural pursuits, is pleasant as well as challenging; for I know the joys and discomforts of agricultural life and hold an inborn fondness for those associations which, even in hours of discouragement, I cannot deny.

PUBLIC SPEAKING

Public speaking contests are major leadership activities in the FFA. They promote skills of speaking to large and small crowds alike. These skills are vital to any field of business you may be in the future. Public Speaking is becoming apparent in more and more contests. For instance, Extemporaneous Public Speaking and Prepared Public Speaking are entirely based on these skills. However, the Job Interview Contest, and even the Computer Applications Contest uses these skills as part of their contest.

Prepared Public Speaking is just what it sounds like. A 6-8 minute speech is given to a panel of judges over a topic of the contestant's choice. The Extemporaneous Speaking Contest, in addition to speaking to judges, contestants must also research the Ag based topic within 30 minutes, and prepare a 4-6 minutes speech to give. Both of these contests, as well as Job Interview and Computers are open to any FFA member interested. These contests take place throughout California.

FAIRS & SHOWS

In order to give our students an area to showcase the knowledge they have learned through their Supervised Occupational Experience Project, Firebaugh FFA competes at three fairs and shows during the year. You will find us at the Madera Fair in September, Cow Palace in March, and at Chowchilla Fair in May.

Some student projects that can be exhibited are beef, sheep, swine, rabbits, chickens, goats, plants, flower arrangements, and agricultural mechanics projects. If you are interested in attending any of these opportunities any one of the Ag Teachers can get you started.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR FIREBAUGH FFA FAIR EXHIBITORS

1. All rules and regulations of the Firebaugh-Las Deltas Unified School District will apply to students who are participating at fairs.
2. Each exhibitor will be responsible for feeding and watering his/her animals during the entire fair. Any time a student is unable to attend his/her animals, arrangements should be made with someone to do so along with the permission and approval of the advisor. All animals are to be fed, watered, washed, and provided with clean bedding by 8:00 AM.
3. Each student will be expected to serve Barn Duty as assigned. Barn Duty consists of
 - a. Exhibitor on barn duty is not to leave the livestock barn area.
 - b. Keeping alleys free from straw and manure.
 - c. Removal of manure from behind Beef and Dairy cattle.
 - d. Checking to see that cattle are tied properly and hog and sheep pens are latched securely.
 - e. Any other duties that may be assigned by the FFA advisor or FFA area chairman.
 - f. Exhibitors are expected to eat lunch/dinner prior to or following barn duty.

4. FFA members will be required to wear an official FFA uniform while showing his/her animals or while helping another member exhibit animals.
5. Where dormitories are provided all members must sleep in the dorm. Bed check will be made at 11:00 PM each night except 12:00 AM Saturday night. Exhibitors not accounted for may be sent home.
6. Where dormitories are not provided, all members must sleep at home and should be off the fairgrounds and out of the parking lot and away from the fair by 11:00 PM each night, with the exception of 12:00 AM midnight on Saturday night.
7. Premium money checks will be handed out to the exhibitors after thank-you letters have been turned in the advisor after the fair.
8. FFA members are expected to have advance excuses from school classes, issued by the Ag. Instructor and signed by all their teachers for the days that they will be missing from school. Those without excuses are expected to be in school.
9. Each exhibitor should read the rules and regulations that are published in the fair's premium book.
10. Smoking, profanity, or misconduct around the livestock area by exhibitors will not be tolerated.
11. All Firebaugh FFA exhibitors are expected to attend the awards program at every fair.
12. All medications administered to show animals must be cleared with the advisor prior to using them.
13. Feed pans are not be left in front of the animals or in pens during the fair.

BANK LOANS

Members of the Firebaugh FFA are able to obtain loans from the Firebaugh Bank One. The following procedure should be used to obtain a loan:

1. Obtain two loan applications from the bank. You fill out one form and your parents fill out the other.
2. Take the completed applications back to the bank. They will check them over for any mistakes.
3. The Ag Boosters will co-sign on the application so you are guaranteed to get the loan regardless of your financial standing.
4. The bank will contact you when your loan has been approved and tell you when your check will be ready.
5. After you pick up your check, take it to one of the Ag teachers so it can be deposited into the FFA Farm Account.

THE OFFICIAL CONSTITUTION OF THE FIREBAUGH CHAPTER OF FFA

Article I. Name and Purposes

Section A. The name of this organization shall be the Firebaugh FFA Chapter. The letters "FFA" will be used to designate the chapter, its activities, or members will be used there of.

Section B. The purpose for which this chapter is formed by are as follows:

- 1.) To develop agricultural leadership skills among all members.
- 2.) To develop a global awareness of agriculture.
- 3.) To bestow confidence among agricultural students and their work.
- 4.) To promote agriculture career opportunities through hands-on training.
- 5.) To develop competencies in communication, human relations, and social abilities.
- 6.) To build cooperative attitudes among agricultural students.
- 7.) To encourage improvement in scholarship.
- 8.) To provide organized recreational activities for agriculture students.

Article II. Organization

Section A. The Firebaugh Chapter of FFA is a chartered local entity of the West Fresno - Madera Section of the California Association, made up of local members.

Section B. This chapter accepts in full the provisions in the constitution and bylaws of the California Association of the FFA as well as those of the National FFA Organization.

Article III. Membership

Section A. Membership is limited to students enrolled in Vocational Agriculture at Firebaugh High School.

Section B. Membership of graduates is limited to students that were active members in high school.

Section C. The Firebaugh FFA is a 100% affiliated chapter with every student becoming a member of the FFA when they enroll in an agricultural class.

Section D. No students may participate in any FFA activities unless they are members in good standing.

Section E. The FFA advisors at their own discretion have the right to dismiss any member from the FFA organization at any time.

Section F. Membership in this chapter shall be of three kinds:
1.) Active
2.) Alumni
3.) Honorary
as defined by the National FFA Constitution.

Section G. The regular work of this chapter shall be carried on by the active membership.

Section H. Honorary membership in the chapter shall be limited to the Honorary FFA Degree.

Section I. There shall be four levels of active membership in their chapter. These levels are:
1.) The Greenhand FFA Degree
» All "Greenhand's" are entitled to wear the regulation bronze emblem charm.
2.) The Chapter FFA Degree
» All members holding the degree of Chapter

FFA are entitled to wear the silver emblem pin.

- 3.) The State FFA Degree
 - » All members holding the degree of State FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem charm.
- 4.) The American FFA Degree
 - » All members holding the degree of American FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem key.

Section J. Greenhand FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Be enrolled in agricultural education and have satisfactory plans for a supervised agricultural experience program.
- 2.) Learn and explain the FFA Creed, Motto, and Salute.
- 3.) Describe and explain the meaning of the FFA emblem and colors.
- 4.) Demonstrate a knowledge of the FFA Code of Ethics and the proper use of the FFA jacket.
- 5.) Demonstrate a knowledge of the history of the organization, the chapter constitution and bylaws and the chapter Program of Activities.
- 6.) Have access to the Official FFA Manual and the FFA Student Handbook.
- 7.) Submit written application for the Greenhand FFA Degree.

Section K. Chapter FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Must have received the Greenhand FFA Degree.
- 2.) Must be enrolled in their second year of agricultural education and have an approved Supervised Agricultural Experience Program.
- 3.) Participated in planning and conducting of at least three official chapter functions.

- 4.) Have earned at least \$150.00 or worked at least 45 hours and have developed plans for the growth of their SOEP.
- 5.) Have effectively led a group discussion for 15 minutes.
- 6.) Have demonstrated five procedures of procedure law.
- 7.) Shows progress toward individual achievement in the FFA awards programs.
- 8.) Have a satisfactory scholastic record.
- 9.) Submit a written application for the Chapter FFA Degree.

Section L. State FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Qualifications for the State FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section M. American FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Qualifications for the American FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section N. Special committees shall review the qualifications of members and make recommendations to the chapter concerning degree advancement.

Article VI. Officers

Section A. The officers of the chapter shall be as follows:

- 1.) President
- 2.) Vice President
- 3.) Secretary
- 4.) Treasurer
- 5.) Reporter
- 6.) Sentinel
- 7.) Advisor

- » The local advisor shall be the teachers of agricultural education in the school where the chapter is located.
- The officers shall perform the usual duties of the respective offices as outlined in the Official FFA Manual.

Section B. Officers shall be elected annually.

Section C. Officer Eligibility. Minimum qualifications to run for chapter office:

- 1.) Must have and maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average.
- 2.) For offices of President and Vice President, the applicant must have already completed at least three years of ag classes, and hold the Chapter FFA Degree.
- 3.) Other offices require that they have completed a year of an ag class, and hold the Greenhand Degree.

Article VII. Impeachment of Officers

Section A. Immediate Impeachment.

The FFA advisors may at any time at their own discretion remove an officer who has repeatedly disregarded his/her duties by not fulfilling them to his/her best ability.

Section B. Steps of Impeachment.

- 1.) Any FFA Chapter Officer not fulfilling the duties of the office as described by this constitution will be required to meet with fellow officers and two advisors to discuss a plan for improvement.
- 2.) A written plan for improvement will be drawn up by the advisor based on the conversation of the meeting in Step 1, and will be confirmed and signed by the FFA President, Vice President, and the officer in question.

- 3.) If the officer in question still does not fulfill his/her duties, then a 2/3 vote of the executive committee will remove that officer from office.

Article VIII. Executive Committee

Section A. The chapter officers shall belong to the Executive Committee.

Section B. No more than one member shall be elected by each Vo-ag class to represent that class at an executive committee meeting. Class representatives shall have an equal vote on the FFA Executive Committee.

Section C. Executive Committee members may not miss more than two consecutive executive committee meetings without an advance excuse for the absence.

Section D. The advisors shall be non-voting members.

Section E. The duties of the executive committee shall be as follows:

- 1.) Meet regularly previous to monthly chapter meetings to plan an agenda.
- 2.) Enforce the constitution and bylaws.
- 3.) Recommend members for Greenhand and Chapter FFA Degrees.
- 4.) Revise the point award system if necessary.

Article IX. Meetings

Section A. Meetings shall be held once a month or as needed. The exact date will be set by the Executive Committee.

Section B. Standard meeting paraphernalia shall be used at each meeting. All special meetings shall open and close with the official ceremony. Parliamentary Procedure shall be used in transacting all business at each meeting.

- Section C. Hats shall not be worn in the meeting room.
- Section D. Poor conduct will result in that member being dismissed from the meeting room.
- Section E. Delegates go through an application process headed by the executive committee to be able to represent the chapter at the State Convention. Other delegates may be named as necessary in order to have proper representation at various other FFA meetings within the state.

Article X. Dues

- Section A. As long as Incentive Grant funds are available dues shall be paid for all members through that source.

Article XI. Eligibility

- Section A. Eligibility of members exhibiting at fairs and shows will be based on the Advisors discretion.
- Section B. Members must maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average overall to be eligible to participate above the chapter level.

Article XII. Amendments

- Section A. To amend the constitution, a 2/3 vote of the active members is required.
- Section B. To become effective, an amendment must be posted for two weeks previous to the vote of the active members.

Article XIII. Ratification of the Constitution

- Section A. This constitution shall become effective when passed by a majority vote of the members voting.
